It has been said that Creation/nature is the first bible. The written word/bible, also divine revelation, came much later. As I am part of creation, the divine is within me too. Divine revelation which means that God/Creator, Great Spirit or the Sacred Divine has been revealed through the natural world and continues to reveal.

For Indigenous people, theirs is an experiential spirituality, known through living rather than from some pre-established theoretical place. Our ancestors knew this and lived by it, so we also need to learn and know what Creation is teaching us. We are not above nature, we are a part of creation, and live by the same laws as all of nature. Indigenous people knew this divine connection and were strong and resilient in it. That we are here today is testament to that. The natural laws teach about balance and living in harmony, the good wisdom and interconnectedness and helps us to reconnect again and again to the sacred within us and in creation. This is the spirituality we are called to return to, it has always been there, so we are to honor all of life – our own, our fellow human beings, and mother earth. Now, more than ever, we are called to this truth and it will be the foundation upon which reconciliation happens. There was an Indigenous worldview happening here previously and another worldview came along. Now we are called to honor and live in balance and wholeness in the midst of these worldviews.

I heard an elder say that he was told that our Indigenous children are born with everything they need within each one of them. Songs, stories, dances, and ceremony and gatherings awakens one to be who they are created to be, and to all those things in nature and in life that help to sustain them spiritually, mentally, and physically.

I read a reflection recently, titled "The Inadequacy of Words", and it affirmed that in the spirit, sometimes there are no words to describe the depth of knowing and being that is possible.

When we were born our Creator set us out on journey. Each one of us was given our own special path. We encounter many great moments of beauty and distractions along the way. Each one teaches us. Sometimes the biggest lessons are the mistakes. We must always have an attentive ear, listening for our Creator's voice to gently quide us.

I want to tell you a story of my nearly eight decades long journey. I had fun along the way. Sometimes I didn't listen too much.

I was always active in our United Church here in Kahnawake. A long time ago I became friends with a young minister. He asked if I'd be interested in taking classes on a Shared ministry program in the city. I loved it. I heard the call but, I had a young family and a good job. Still my dream was becoming a Minister in the Church.

In 1980, I went to White Bear, Saskatchewan to attend the First Consultation on Native Ministry. It changed my life. I met many native people from all different nations. I had never met another Onkwehonwe (Indigenous) person from different nations. I learned so much when I listened to their stories, their language, their legends, cultures. I saw their love of our Creator. But I also heard of the struggles they all had -- of racism, of residential schools and of the abuse they suffered, which lead to alcoholism, and poverty.

In 1992 many of my friends in the Indigenous Church urged me to begin seriously on the path of becoming a minister. At the time, I said "OK!" I was so excited. This was the biggest decision of my life. And then everything stopped. I thought my family was with me. But I failed to fill them in what was ahead for them. My life's bubble burst and it took me a while to straighten it out. I still had my dream. Sometimes as I watched my friends being ordained, it brought tears to my eyes because of my own lost dream.

In 2019 I was invited to the Sandy-Saulteaux Spiritual Centre to sit in on a learning circle as an Elder. I loved it and I was asked If would like to be a potential student. I've been there for over a year. I feel young again and I'm learning so much. My journey continues. I was asked a couple of weeks ago if I would like to become a CDM (Congregational Designated Minister) here in Kahnawake. I said yes and I am so excited. My church family is happy to hear, they are calling this good news and fully support me. In 1992, my mother was so happy to hear my calling to go into Ministry. Today, I know her spirit smiles and she knows I have heard God's call.

Like I said many times, My Creator, "Sonkwaiatieson" is with me and gently pushing me along. This has been my dream. Where will God lead me next? This I know.... no matter, he walks alongside with me. Nia wen Kowa (A great big thank you in my language - Mohawk)

We launched the Return of the Buffalo Podcast in December. Return of the Buffalo is the name given to the work of fostering family wellbeing at SSSC.




