A place like Sandy-Saulteaux, where healing happens, is something to celebrate!

Our Keeper of Learning, Rev. Bruce Kakakaway reflects on what the four colours and the four directions of the medicine wheel teach us: "Life is a journey. Every part of our journey has to be celebrated, our birth, our teen years, our school years and everything else, and then our death."

Our April Learning Circle Elder adds "When we look at people's customs and traditions around the world, everybody celebrates, whether it's certain seasons, or periods of time in a person's life."

"When somebody makes an achievement that we want to recognize, the importance of that is the comradery, bringing people together as a circle of friends or family. That's where people get motivated to finish things. People see, if others can do it, I can do it."


Our journeys aren't always easy. "When you know there's a reward, whether it's public or even just personal, it's important to have times when we recognize the progress we have made."

Bruce reflects on the roots of our traditions of celebratory gatherings. "It started a long time ago when we had to separate, when we couldn't take the babies and the older people with us when we left to harvest food, hunt and stuff. When our communities were reunited, we were happy. You can imagine people saying, "Thank God you're ok, you're still here, I just love you!" That's where our celebrations come from. It's about reconnecting with people. It's spiritual."

Our Elder explains that emotions can be understood as e-motion, or energy in motion. These celebrations that bring big emotions energize us. "In hockey when you score a goal, you celebrate, even if you haven't won the game yet but it's going towards your ultimate goal. You celebrate those highlights in your life because it gives you the momentum to keep going."

Unlike entertainment that can sometimes distract us from our goals to live spiritually, we want to celebrate in ways that help us see what is really going on and connect to what really matters. May we all have times to pause and notice what and who we have to be grateful for, recognizing our growth and encouraging each other on our journeys.

When you give to Sandy-Saulteaux Spiritual Centre, you are supporting such celebration. In this place, people are encouraged on their healing journeys and take steps that are cause for celebration. People come to reconnect with themselves, with their families, with their culture, with Mother Earth and with the Great Spirit who holds us all in the mystery of life. Always for the Good of Our People by Wayne Monague

My journey into Sandy-Saulteaux has been a long life journey.

My family has always been fully involved in many aspects of spirituality, both within the United Church on my reserve, Christian Island, as well as in the traditional way of our people. As a young child, I always knew what was happening first Sunday morning. It was always service. My reserve was physically separated in the beginning: there was a Catholic side and a United side. My father was from the Catholic side and my mother was from the United side. Growing up I was exposed to both and was taught via my family to respect both, even though it was not meant that way in generations before me.

As this was happening, I was also, unknowingly, given traditional teachings from both sets of grandparents. The more I experienced life, the older I got, the more I stayed in tune with both churches and was further exposed to our traditional teachings.

I independently choose to learn the 3 Fires Medewin Lodge teachings, which I am currently still referred to as an initiate. I

spent some time in my younger years feeling that both my younger teachings of the church were in fact different then the now, new traditional ways I was being taught. Again, as I matured more and became more open to my own spirit, the more I was able to see how every teaching from all aspects I have been exposed to are one in the same. Different structures and ceremonies, however from a distance the messages from scripture are the same as the teachings I received in ceremony.

I have been receiving these my whole life, since birth and in fact we all have this ability which is outlined in every form of spirit practise I have experienced. In maintaining my spiritual self, I was able to recognize that I never received the "calling". It has always been with me, and in fact is with everyone and has also always been.

Being a part of the Indigenous based class of Sandy-Saulteaux has allowed me to work farther within the church to help others see things that we all have in that good spiritual way. Always for the good of our people.
